<u>Prayer</u>

"Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you."

Definition

You spend time with God, listening to God, resting in his presence. You tell God that you love him, that you cherish his tenderness, his closeness in every situation, and his love that protects you. You grow in a loving friendship with God. Your prayer comes from the heart; it is a sign of warm love for God.

Generosity

"You should give what you have decided to give, not grudgingly or because you are made to, for God loves a cheerful giver."

Definition

You give what you have by sharing it with others or helping someone who is in need. You give and do not expect a gift in return or any attention, praise or reward for giving and you do it cheerfully. To share what you have teaches you not to be selfish. Generosity helps you to treat other people as your neighbour. You are not afraid of losing what you give. You are generous because you know there is enough for everyone.

How do we show generosity?

We notice others' needs and so we give of our time, gifts and talents. We regularly practise acts of generosity. We are quick to praise, we seek opportunities to give what we can. We give without expectation of reward.

We often pray as a community to ask for help for ourselves or others. We also pray to worship and praise and thank God.

But God wants a personal relationship with each of us, so as in any family or beautiful friendship, we have to find time to spend alone with each other – to talk and to listen.

The listening part can be very hard but if we are willing to give time and practise listening, we will be greatly blessed.

Like any relationship, once a year isn't enough. In our best relationships, we talk or communicate daily or at least regularly. We look forward to spending time together and know our friend will always support us through all our joys and struggles. This doesn't happen overnight – we give our time, love and attention to it.

And so, with God, time in prayer, time alone together is essential. God doesn't need it - we do!

Like all things that are good for us – it requires discipline.

Reflect on your current prayer life and if you haven't started it's never too late.

Start small and regular and know our loving God is always waiting with open arms to hear us and encourage us.

Gathering together

Focal point: Green cloth, examples of books, exercise books, pens/pencils etc, school jumper, reading record etc

Introduction:

Discuss with the children the start of the new school year, what we want to achieve, our goals, hopes, dreams for the year. What do you enjoy about school? Which subjects are your favourite? Do you enjoy learning new things?

In this virtue, we are thinking about finding joy in our learning, even if sometimes we find it difficult.

Word: (Show image below)

"Show me your ways Lord, teach me Your paths" Psalm 25:4

Response to/reflection on the Word

Think about the verse we have just read. What does this mean for us as we start our new school year? How can we follow God's guidance to stay on the right path? We can trust in God to make the right choices, to be the best version of ourselves throughout our journey this year in school.

Play some reflective music and ask the children to think about their goals and hopes this year.

Share some if they feel comfortable. Ask God to help the children achieve these goals, e.g. We thank you Lord for bringing us all together at the start of a new school year. Help us to enjoy our learning and give everything we can to be the best we can be.

Amen.

Going forth

Give each child the template and ask then to draw or write a goal they want to achieve this year, that they can ask God to help them with. They can then place them in a jar in class, or in their trays to reflect upon throughout the year.



Gathering together

Focal point: Green cloth, display the 'Our Father Prayer', crucifix

Introduction:

Who inspires you? Who do you look to help you get better at things? (e.g. teachers, sports coaches, parents etc Show images of famous inspirational people below). What qualities make them inspirational? What virtues do they demonstrate?

This week we are thinking about Jesus as an inspirational teacher. Jesus taught His disciples and His followers using stories to help them understand important messages.

Word: Matthew 5:1-12

Now when Jesus saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, ² and he began to teach them.

The Beatitudes

He said:

- ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- ⁴ Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- ⁵ Blessed are the meek,

for they will inherit the earth.

- ⁶ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- ⁷ Blessed are the merciful,

for they will be shown mercy.

⁸ Blessed are the pure in heart,

for they will be called children of God.

¹⁰ Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Response to/reflection on the Word

Play reflective music.

What makes Jesus a good teacher?

How do we know that people wanted to listen to Him? (crowds followed Him)

How did He explain God's will to people in a way they could understand? (parables, stories, plain language etc)

What messages can we take from His teaching in today's reading?

Christ Jesus, help us to listen to Your message and follow Your example. Amen.

Going forth

Pick one of the 'blesseds' from the reading and ask the children tp focus on trying to be that for this week. E.g. Ask the children to try to be peacemakers this week. Ask them to give each other the sign of peace to show this before they leave.

Alternatively, each child could receive one of the bookmarks below.



Virtue: Love of learning

Gathering together

Focal point: Green cloth, examples of books, exercise books, pens/pencils etc, plant or wheatsheaf (link to parable).

Introduction:

Think about the goals you set during the first Virtue act of worship. How will you achieve them? What do you need to do as a learner to help yourself?

They need to look after themselves (sleep, rest, eat well, exercise, mindfulness etc). Link to other virtues such as resilience, perseverance, hope etc Talk to the children about them having responsibility for their own learning too.

Word: Matthew 13:1-8

That same day Jesus left the house and went to the lakeside, where he sat down to teach. 2 The crowd that gathered around him was so large that he got into a boat and sat in it, while the crowd stood on the shore. 3 He used parables to tell them many things.

"Once there was a man who went out to sow grain. 4 As he scattered the seed in the field, some of it fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. 5 Some of it fell on rocky ground, where there was little soil. The seeds soon sprouted, because the soil wasn't deep. 6 But when the sun came up, it burned the young plants; and because the roots had not grown deep enough, the plants soon dried up. 7 Some of the seed fell among thorn bushes, which grew up and choked the plants. 8 But some seeds fell in good soil, and the plants bore grain: some had one hundred grains, others sixty, and others thirty."

Response to/reflection on the Word

What happened to the seeds that fell on rocky ground? What happened to those that fell on only a little soil? Which seeds grew well? What is the message that Jesus is teaching us here?

What do we need to do to bear fruit? How can we 'grow' well?

Talk to the children about them listening to God's word, following in Jesus' footsteps but also having responsibility for their own growth and learning.

Thank you God for giving us seeds of knowledge to help us learn. Help us and guide us as learners to embrace new knowledge, seek Your truth and reach our potential. Amen.

Going forth

Everybody to learn one new thing this week. Leader could give an example of one thing he/she would like to learn.

Virtue: Responsible Citizenship

Gathering together

Focal point:

Circle of friends candle holder

Prepared 'love' words

Introduction

Today we are going to talk about 'love'. Ask the children to think about someone they love. We love our families, our friends, we love God. Explain to the children that in the Bible the Greek word for love can be translated in four different ways. Show the cards, explaining each:

Eros – romantic love, like we see when a couple gets married

Philia – love of your friends

Storge – love of parents for their children/ family

Agape - God's love of mankind

Agape defines God's immeasurable, incomparable love for humankind. It is the divine love that comes from God. Agape love is perfect, unconditional, sacrificial, and pure. This is the kind of love that we are asked to have for our neighbours.

Today we are going to listen to the Bible, where Jesus gives us a special commandment, to love each other.

Word:

John 15:12-17

My commandment is this: love one another, just as I love you. The greatest love you can have for your friends is to give your life for them. And you are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because servants do not know what their master is doing. Instead, I call you friends, because I have told you everything I heard from my Father. You did not choose me; I chose you and appointed you to go and bear much fruit, the kind of fruit that endures. And so the Father will give you whatever you ask of him in my name. This, then, is what I command you: love one another.

Response to/reflection on the Word

Jesus is asking us in this reading to love each other as God loves us. This is about showing each other kindness and patience. It is about forgiving each other's mistakes and sharing what we have.

A definition of love must start with God. Love that is genuine comes from God because "God is love" (1 John 4:16).





Gathering together

Focal point:

Circle of friends candle holder

Cross/crucifix

Liturgical cloth

Basket of paper hearts to write on at the end

Have PPT of St Teresa ready to view, or the quotes printed out to show the children.

Discuss what St T says about how we should treat others. How does this relate to the discussion about love from the previous week? She shows great 'agape' love – love and care for others and encourages others to do the same. Today we are going to listen to what St Paul says about love, how without it, we are nothing.

Word:

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

I may be able to speak the languages of human beings and even of angels, but if I have no love, my speech is no more than a noisy gong or a clanging bell. I may have the gift of inspired preaching; I may have all knowledge and understand all secrets; I may have all the faith needed to move mountains—but if I have no love, I am nothing. I may give away everything I have, and even give up my body to be burned—but if I have no love, this does me no good.

Love is patient and kind; it is not jealous or conceited or proud; love is not ill-mannered or selfish or irritable; love does not keep a record of wrongs; love is not happy with evil, but is happy with the truth. Love never gives up; and its faith, hope, and patience never fail.

Love is eternal. There are inspired messages, but they are temporary; there are gifts of speaking in strange tongues, but they will cease; there is knowledge, but it will pass. For our gifts of knowledge and of inspired messages are only partial; but when what is perfect comes, then what is partial will disappear.

Meanwhile these three remain: faith, hope, and love; and the greatest of these is love.

Response to/reflection on the Word

Think about what St Paul said about love. He says it is 'eternal', It is 'patient and kind', it 'never gives up'.

St Teresa tells us that love has no meaning if it is not shared. It has to be put into action.

How can you put your love into action this week? What small things can you do with love?

Going forth

Ask the children to take a heart out of the basket as they leave and draw or write one thing they will try to do this week to show love to their neighbour.

Ideas for music:

'Oh Lord all the world belongs to you'

'When I needed a neighbour were you there?'

'We are one in the spirit'

Virtue: Responsible Citizenship

Gathering together

Focal point: Circle of friends candle holder Cross/crucifix Liturgical cloth

Introduction

Have PPT about the Pope ready to view, or the quotes printed out to show the children.

Discuss what Pope Francis says about how we should treat others. What does being a 'responsible citizen' mean? A citizen is a member of a community. Being a responsible citizen means you want to play your part within your school, workplace or neighbourhood. You are committed to finding ways to help your community, seeing each person in your community as your neighbour. You put your faith and love for others into actions. How does this relate to the discussion about love from the previous week? Today we are going to listen to how Jesus asks us to treat others.

Word:

Matthew 5:1-12

Read the remaining parts of the PPT that has the words of Jesus followed by an explanation for the children – you could ask a child or another adult to help you read the different parts.

Response to/reflection on the Word

What does these sayings of Jesus mean for us as responsible citizens? Jesus asks us to be humble and kind, He asks us to reach out to others to comfort them, to work for justice in our world, to be merciful, to search for what is good and to be peacemakers. All fo these actions show our love for others. Play gentle music.

Ask the children to reflect on just one of these. How can they be peacemakers? How can they show gentleness? How can they show kindness? How can they work for justice?

Going forth

Think back to the slide where Pope Francis says:

'To live as true children of God means to love our neighbour and to be close to those who are lonely and in difficulty.'.

How can we be children of God this week? Ask children to try to do one thing this week to be a good neighbour.

Ideas for music:

'Jesus says love everybody'

'The love I have for you'



Focus: When we Pray.

Prayer enables us to develop our friendship with Jesus. We spend time with and talk to our friends each day; we should do this with Jesus by praying to him each day. When we pray we listen to and talk to Jesus and we grow in a loving friendship with Him.

Word: A Reading from The Book of Kings

A long, long time ago, there was a priest called Eli.
He was very old and was going blind.
But a young boy called Samuel looked after him.
One night when Samuel was in bed,
He heard someone calling his name,
'Samuel! Samuel!'
So he got up and went to Eli and said,
'Here I am, what do you want?'
But Eli said,
'I didn't call you!
Go back to bed'
So Samuel went and lay down again.

This happened a second and third time. When it happened a third time,

Eli said, 'Next time you must say, "Yes, Lord I am listening."

Virtue to live by:

Gathering together

Focal point: Green

Physical examples or images of 'valuables', e.g. iphone, car, house etc also images of famous people, e.g. Marcus Rashford (footballer), Charli d'Amelio (influencer), Taylor Swift (singer)

Introduction:

What is important to us? Discuss some of the images/items on display. What do they 'hold dear' to their hearts? Who do they want to be like? What do they spend their time on? Today we are thinking about our treasures.

Word:

"Do not store up treasures for yourself on earth... But store up treasures for yourselves in heaven... For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:19-21)

Response to/reflection on the Word

What are our treasures? (refer to the images on display) What do we value? What should we value? We should invest in putting God first, in people, in worship, in putting others before ourselves. If we spend our time thinking about material values, can we spend enough time with God and each other? Looking after each other? (refer to previous worship linked to the Beatitudes). We should give of ourselves to others, treasure God's word. Everything we have is a gift from God. What are we thankful for? Being thankful helps us to be generous to others. When we are grateful for what we have, we can share wholeheartedly. What do we treasure that we can share?

Heavenly Father, help us to value the spent with You and with each other. Help us to think about what is really important in life and give ourselves generously. Amen.

Going forth

Give each child a picture of a treasure box (below). Children write or draw to show what their treasure is, what they can give to others.

Ideas for music:

Seek ye first Sing of the Lord's goodness A new commandment Count your blessings
















Virtue: Generosity

Virtue to live by:

I am generous.

I think of others and notice when they need help.

Gathering together

Focal point: Green (if still in ordinary time, purple with Advent wreath if in Advent), Christmas presents, Christmas decorations etc

Introduction:

Explain 're-gifting' to the children. Have they ever given a gift that they didn't want themselves to someone else? What does this tell the person that we have given it to? Do we value the person that we are giving the unwanted gift to? Have we thought about them carefully? Are we giving what we don't really want or need? Something 'spare'? In today's Gospel reading, Jesus tells us about an old lady who gives everything she has to God, not just what she has 'spare'.

Word: Luke 21:1-4

Jesus looked around and saw rich people dropping their gifts in the Temple treasury, 2 and he also saw a very poor widow dropping in two little copper coins. 3 He said, "I tell you that this poor widow put in more than all the others. 4 For the others offered their gifts from what they had to spare of their riches; but she, poor as she is, gave all she had to live on."

Response to/reflection on the Word

In this story, the old widow actually gave very little in terms of money, certainly not as much as some of the other people. Why then, did Jesus say her gift was more valuable? Because she gave all that she had. What is Jesus' message in this story? Jesus isn't expecting you to hand over all of your pocket money! But what He is asking us to do, is give generously. Whatever it is we have to give, let us give with our whole hearts.

Going forth

Sometimes giving can be hard, it can take a lot from us. What can you give to the person you find it hardest to give to?

Ideas for music:

Amazing Grace God forgave my sin

This little light of mine Servant King (last verse) Make me a channel of your peace "Give a Little Bit" by Supertramp

Virtue: Generosity

Virtue to live by:

I am generous.

I think of others and notice when they need help.

Gathering together

Focal point: Purple cloth, Advent wreath, Christmas presents, Christmas decorations etc

<u>Introduction:</u> What time of year is it? (Hopefully Advent will be the response, but also Christmas!)

At Christmas, we all go out and buy lots of presents for each other. How do you feel if you give a present to someone but they don't give one back? They would be off my Christmas list the next year! In today's reading, Jesus asks us to give freely. What do you think that might mean?

Word:

"Freely you have received, freely give." (Matthew 10:8)

Response to/reflection on the Word

When Jesus tells us to give freely, He asks us to give generously, without expectation of anything in return, just as He did. When He died for us on the cross, when He healed people, when He taught them, He did all this without asking anything in return. How can we follow this example? We give to others, we should give with a generous heart, not because we want something in return. Unlike us, God does not expect gifts back. He loves us no matter what. How does this make you feel? God loved us so much, He gave us Jesus, Jesus loved us so much, He gave us Himself on the cross – what can YOU give each other?

Going forth

Give the children the present drawing. Ask them to think of their gift to someone – could it be their time, their love, their patience? Ask the children for their ideas. None of these 'gifts' should cost any money! Remind the children that they should give without asking for anything in return. Put the drawings in a gift box for display in class to remind them of what they can give to others.

Ideas for music:



CIRCLE TIME: YEAR: FOUNDATION STAGE

Virtue 1 (Autumn 1): Love of Learning:

I am a lifelong learner

I am excited and enthusiastic to learn

PSHCE:

Play an active role as a member of society.

Knowledge:

To know that my school is place of learning and that my teachers want me to enjoy what I learn.

Skills:

Learning requires a range of skills and I can learn through playing, exploring, reading and thinking.

Attitudes:

I can learn in a way that inspires and excites me, and others around me.

Circle Time Rules:

We listen to each other.

We do not say or do anything that would hurt another person.

We signal when we want to say something.

We may say pass.

If a game involves touch we may sit and watch before making a decision to join in.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

Learn something new – In pairs, ask a friend to tell you something about themselves or something they have learned recently. Try to make it something new that you don't already know. Share your new knowledge.

Step 2. Round

Puppet demonstrates attending their first day at school, puppet appears shy and confused to start with but learns new facts and becomes excited, happy and engaged. How are we like this puppet 'friend' when we are at school?

Trigger statement:

I am learning new things every single day.

Step 3. Open Forum

Two puppets, one covers its face – looking sad. "I find learning hard." Second puppet joins the interaction, "I sometimes do but I find it fun too and it's good to be challenged." "You can ask your teachers to help too."

Step 4. Celebration

The teacher asks if anybody has noticed any of the children being a good learner and why. Give out certificates for children who have been actively learning.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

CIRCLE TIME: YEAR 1/2

Virtue 1 (Autumn 1): Love of Learning:

PSHCE:

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Circle Time Rules:

We listen to each other.

We do not say or do anything that would hurt another person.

We signal when we want to say something.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

Write (or draw) a fact that you have learned recently or found interesting. Opportunity for cross-curricular learning; using non-fiction books. Put all the facts into a box or bowl in the middle. Pull out a fact at a time and try to guess whose fact it was!

Step 2. Round

Class teacher to send a Chinese whisper around the circle (This could be a fact or something interesting that has been recently learned)... discuss whether the learning was passed on or did it get in a muddle! Listening is one way we learn, how many other ways can we think of that we learn? Encourage children to discuss in talk partners (using books, the internet, trying new ideas for ourselves, listening to others etc.)

Trigger statement:

We can all learn something new each day.

Step 3. Open Forum

Have the following qualities printed out on sheets;

In talk partners, ask children to put these qualities of a learner in order;

- i) Perseverance keeping on going when things are hard
- ii) Exploration trying new ideas
- iii) Connection making links with what I already know

Which do you think is the most important and why? Which is the least important and why?

(Talk partners).

Step 4. Celebration

Dance and sing this celebratory song; https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QO6der8d4L4

Think about children in the class who have demonstrated perseverance, exploration and connecting in their learning.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

On a heart-shaped cut out, write one or two words that show what you most love about learning something new. Hang these as a display as children enter the classroom – in a doorway or on a prominent display.

P.E. because I like learning new ball skills.

Step 2. Round

Lead discussion, celebrating all the different things we can learn and that we all enjoy different things.

Trigger statement:

When you are an adult you're too old to learn. Discuss.

Step 3. Open Forum

Give the children a variety of images e.g. a toddler taking first steps, a car with an L-plate, a piano teacher sat beside a pupil, a teacher standing beside a whiteboard, showing a friend how to ride a bike. Also include some more scenes that could be interpreted openly... two people walking alongside each other, two animals looking at the same bowl of food!

Ask children what learning could be happening here? Children feedback ideas to the class.

Step 4. Celebration

Listen to the song:

Step 2. Round:

Listen to the following story;

Imagine you had servants who would do everything for you. They would wash and dress you and give you breakfast, they would bring you anything you wanted and provide you with everything but you were not allowed to learn to do anything for yourself or follow any interests or skills.

How long would you enjoy this for? What do you think it means to have a love of learning? What do you love to learn about? Who do you love to learn with or from?

Trigger statement:

"Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day, teach him how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."

Encourage discussion about the benefits of life-long learning.

Step 3. Open Forum

Set up small group debates in which two teams argue for or against one of the following statements;

Learning languages is more important than learning to play a musical instrument.

When I finish school I won't need to learn any more.

Learning is my job not my teacher's.

Step 4. Celebration

Write a prayer that celebrates all the learning you have done today, this week and this year.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Say five things you have learned to do that you couldn't do a year ago! Say five things that you would like to learn in the coming year.

Teacher asks puppet to think about other places where s/he feels safe and where people care about him/her.

Trigger statement:

People care about me at...

Step 3. Open Forum

Introduce a new puppet to the children and have an item of school uniform on her e.g. a school jumper or tie. Puppet tells the teacher that it is his/her first day at (add own school name) and s/he doesn't know anyone, s/he feels very scared and that s/he doesn't belong here.

Puppet asks the children if they could help him/her to feel part of (add own school name).

Step 4. Celebration

Is there anyone you would like to say thank you to for helping you to feel that you belong to (your school name). Nominate 3 children and give each one a cheer and a sticker.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Sing:

'Bag of sweets' game.

Teacher tells the class to imagine they all have a wonderful bag of sweets on their knees. Think of what they have, e.g. is it smarties, jelly babies etc.

"Now you are going to share it with the person next to you."

- 1. Everyone can then stand up and offer sweets to others, remembering to say thank you. OR
- 2. Choose certain children to stand up and offer sweets to others.

Step 2. Round

Puppet is looking really glad. S/he tells the children that s/he's feeling really glad because his/her friend and s/he have been playing together and they've had such a wonderful time..."We really love each other," says puppet.

Teacher: What have you each been doing that has made you feel like you love each other?

Puppet: We've, been taking turns, we've been sharing and I just love it when we all get along together.

[The following round is aimed at our youngest children. Some of them will be able to identify actions which express love but even for adults love is an extremely complex concept so we need to start simply and with where children are at.]

Trigger statement:

I love it when...

Step 3. Open Forum

Puppet: Mmmmm I'm really stuck I want to do something to show my friend that I love her/him. I wonder what I could do? I wonder if you would help me? I could make a picture for her/him...would you help me?

[Lay a large piece of paper in the middle of the circle. Place some large felts around the paper. Let children come out randomly to help puppet create a picture with the children.]

I wonder what s/he might feel when s/he gets my picture?

Step 4. Celebration

Ask the children to look around the circle. Remind the children about the focus of their circle time. Is there anybody in the circle who the children would like to nominate or say thank you to for showing love to them this week?

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Pass a smile, a thumbs up or a wave around the circle.

Discuss with the children the things we all do in school. Encourage children to think of people in our school and what they do and why they do it. Ask the children if they can think of one thing that they do to support the school as a community.

Trigger statement:

I help ...

Step 3. Open Forum

Puppet says she is quite shocked because she saw that one of the dinner time supervisors was very upset because some children had thrown water all over the toilet floor and had not

tidied up their classroom at the end of dinner time. Puppet says the dinner supervisor was very upset. Ask the children what they could do to help the dinner supervisor. Children respond

Step 4. Celebration

Ask the children to nominate children who they have noticed trying to support the midday supervisors at lunchtime. Ask the children to be specific about what actions they have noticed the children taking.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Ask children to pass a pat on the shoulder around the circle and say well done.

You then say, 'All the Twinkle, Twinkles stand up and run round and find a new seat.' Then ask all the Little Stars to stand up, run round and find a new seat. You should then have the children sitting next to people who are not their best friends.

Step 2. Round

Discuss with the children how you show love and help towards others. Try to be very specific about what the children might see or hear if you were showing love or help towards another. Next, ask them to close their eyes or look down. Can the children visualise a time when they were showing love or help towards another. Next, ask them to share what they did.

Trigger statement:

I showed love/help by...

Step 3. Open Forum

Puppet: I'm feeling really sad...I don't know how to do my letters...they just keep going all over the place...I don't know what to do and I just feel like giving up...

Teacher: How could we help puppet if she was in our class?

Step 4. Celebration

Ask the children if they would like to nominate or thank someone who has shown them love or help. Do ask the children to be specific in terms of the actions that demonstrated love or help.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

The children pass a handshake around the circle and say thank you for being in circle time.

Starcatcher (101 Games for Social Skills, Jenny Mosley and Helen Sonnet)

Tell the children that they are lights floating in the night sky. Choose one child to be the Starcatcher. The Starcatcher stands in the centre and the lights move around them. You will say "Lights to star bright. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5." The lights have to get into groups of 5. They form stars by putting their left hands together in the centre of a circle and stretching out their right arms like the rays of a star. On the number 5, the Starcatcher tries to catch any spare lights that are floating about by touching them on the shoulder. The Starcatcher may do this only during a second count to 5. Any lights that are caught become Starcatchers as well, and the game continues. The Star catchers work together to try to corner spare lights and the stars work together by trying to distract the Star catchers.

Step 2. Round

Discuss with the children the various communities to which they belong, eg home, school, parish, town, brownies, beavers, cubs, clubs etc. Talk about how people in communities work together and help each other. What does belonging mean to the children and how does it feel to belong?

Trigger statement:

When I belong I feel ...

Step 3. Open Forum

To support children new to Circle Time the teacher can prepare a simple role-play of a child asking for help.

Teacher in role:

I need help because I'm new...I don't really feel like I fit in...The other day some children were making fun of the way I speak...I know I speak a bit differently to everyone else but I don't know how to fit in and I really hate feeling on the outside all the time...

The children respond "Would it help if I?" or

"Would it help if you?" or

"Would it help if we?"

[As soon as you think your class are ready children in class can request help from their peer group]

Plan, do and review (The teacher can be included here!)

Step 4. Celebration

Suggest to the children that they look around the circle. Is there anyone that they would like to offer a special mention or thanks to, perhaps because that person always tries to include people whether they are close friends or not.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Pass a bunch of keys around the circle as quietly as possible, encouraging the group to work together to achieve the aim.

The Lawyer starts again, asking each person questions and putting them out if they answer. To progress to the next rule and make it more sophisticated, no one may answer 'Yes' or 'No'... New rules may be added as you go along.

Step 2. Round:

Discuss with the children about places where we have a feeling of belonging.

Discuss with the children how rules are there to help people feel safe and secure in a group or community.

Trigger statement:

I feel a sense of belonging when... I think ... is a valuable school rule.

Step 3. Open Forum

To support children new to Circle Time the teacher can prepare a simple role-play of a child asking for help.

Teacher in role:

I need help because I try very hard to follow the class rules like keeping the cloakroom tidy and working guietly when asked to, but I am getting fed up of some people in the class who just do not follow the class rules. I sometimes wonder why I bother.

The children respond: "Would it help if I?" or "Would it help if you?" or "Would it help if we?"

[As soon as you think your class are ready children in class can request help from their peer group]

Plan, do and review (The teacher can be included here!)

Step 4. Celebration

Ask the children to look round the circle. Is there anyone they have noticed trying to keep a particular rule? Can the children say what they have noticed being specific about what they have either seen, heard or noticed? How is this the same as being a good citizen?

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Pass the sign for respect around the circle.

Step 1. Game

Find the Kinds of Prayer

Puppet is watching the game.

The children are given a card — blank on one side. The children do not look at the word/symbol on the card until the game starts. On the words "ready, steady go" the children move about the space to find others with the same word/symbol card until they are in four groups — all sit together in a circle. You could extend the game by asking the children to say something to someone with the same word/symbol card, e.g. "thank you for ..." "well done ..." "Please can I ...", "I'm sorry for ..." The four words/symbols are "thank you" (symbol — thank you emoji) "praise" (symbol — praise emoji), "asking" (symbol — asking emoji), "sorry" (symbol — sorry emoji).

Step 2. Round

The kinds of prayer cards are placed in front of the children face up on the floor.

Puppet has enjoyed playing the game and goes round the circle, looking at the children and their cards, points out some of the words and names of the children, e.g., Poppy, Scarlet and Bede – have the "thank you" card. Peter, Imran and Mia have the "praise" card etc.

Trigger statement:

(Dear) God thank you for God vou are wonderful because ... God please can you help ... God I am sorry ...

Step 3. Open Forum

Puppet: "I'm a bit puzzled ... I don't know how to pray, I don't know what to do, can you help me? Teacher asks the children to respond.

Puppet is so pleased they want to ask for more help and shows the children a tray with some things to help them pray: on the tray is a song book/A4 sheet of music, holding cross, a card with the word listen with emoji symbol

Teacher asks the children to say why they help us pray? Teacher asks the children "what other things can help us pray?" Children respond.

Step 4. Celebration

Gather the children around. Create a quiet, reflective atmosphere and play some quiet music. Light a candle. Ask them to breathe in and out. Each child chooses an alliterative adjective to place after their name. Explain that the description should be positive; for example, Fiona friendly, Karl kind , Mary marvellous, Wayne wonderful. Ask for volunteers to begin the game, so that the more confident children show the others what to do. Each child is then asked to introduce themselves with a symbolic gesture. For example, John joyful might open his arms and jump with joy. The other children say the child's name in the same tone of voice and copy their gesture.

(Make sure all children are able to think of a suitable word; if they are stuck ask the other children for suggestions.)

Step 2. Round

Puppet says that they've met 4 jelly babies who are named after different kinds of prayer. They can remember their names but unfortunately can't remember the kind of prayer they are. "Can you help me work it out?"

Puppet shows them the 4 jelly babies:

Peter, Suzy, Andy and Thea. Can you think of the kind of prayer each of them. Have cards, each one with a kind of prayer on if pupils find it too difficult to think of a type of prayer that matches the name.

(Peter Praise, Suzy Sorry, Andy Ask, Thea Thanks)

Trigger statement:

My favourite kind of prayer is

Step 3. Open Forum

Puppet is so pleased that they can remember the kinds of prayer each jelly baby is they want to ask for more help and shows the children a tray with some things to help them pray: on the tray is a song book/A4 sheet of music, holding cross, a card with the word listen with emoji symbol

Teacher asks the children to say why they help us pray?

Step 4. Celebration

Skills:

Praying requires a range of skills and I can pray with my body and special objects, by listening, speaking and resting.

Attitudes:

When I pray it helps me think of God, other people and it gives me hope.

Circle Time Rules:

We listen to each other.

We do not say or do anything that would hurt another person.

We signal when we want to say something.

We may say pass.

If a game involves touch we may sit and watch before making a decision to join in.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game On the Beach.

What to do – Children sit in a circle. Children close their eyes and imagine they are walking on a beach which is made up of really soft golden sand. Can they feel the sand under their feet and between their toes? Imagine what they feel like......It is warm and sunny. Think of the sun on your face......Imagine its warmth. Now think of it on your back, feel the heat as you walk along.... You can see the blue sea, twinkling and glittering in the sunlight... Imagine that you are walking down the beach to the water's edge. You are near the sea now. You can feel the breeze from it gently wafting over your body. Can you taste the salt in the air? You can hear the waves rolling in and then the wave trickling back out again. You look down and see a beautiful sea shell sticking out of the sand. Pick it up and look at it carefully. Feel it, is it smooth or rough? You put it in your bag and walk back up the beach. You feel warm, relaxed and happy as you go. The beach scene is going to fade away gradually but no one can take away your special shell and the special time you've had. Tuck that special thought into your memory box. You can get it out in your mind if you ever need to cheer yourself up. Now I want to open your eyes and smile at as many people as possible. (adapted from *More Quality Circle Time -* Jenny Mosley).

Step 2. Round

The teacher discusses with the children what they felt during the guided meditation. Did they like the meditation, why? Did they wonder about anything? What helped them to be still and concentrate? What helped them to listen?

Trigger statement:

I can be still and listen ...

Step 3 Open Forum

The teacher places different objects or artefacts that could be used to help us pray (holding crosses, a selection of beads e.g. rosary beads, prayer cards, bible story books, bibles, candle, something to represent music). The teacher in role tells pupils that they are really finding it difficult at the moment to concentrate when they are praying. Invite the pupils to respond "Would it help if you?" etc.

Invite selected pupils to choose an object from the centre of the circle and say why it helps them pray.

Step 4. Celebration

The teacher says they have 4 jelly babies that I've named after different kinds of prayer. These are their names but can you think of which kind of prayer they are. "Can you help me work it out?" The teacher shows the children the 4 jelly babies:

Peter, Suzy, Andy, Thea. Can you think of the kind of prayer each of them. Jelly babies can be given out (optional).

(Peter Praise, Suzy Sorry, Andy Ask, Thea Thanks,)

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Ask the children to close their eyes. Is there anyone or anything they would like to pray for?

CIRCLE TIME: YEARS: 5/6

Virtue 3 (Autumn 2): Prayer:

I grow in friendship with God through prayer

Knowledge:

To know that my school is a place of prayer and that there are different kinds of prayer and different ways of praying.

Skills:

Praying requires a range of skills and I can pray with my body and special objects, by listening, speaking and resting.

Attitudes:

When I pray it helps me think of God, other people and it gives me hope.

Circle Time Rules:

We listen to each other.

We do not say or do anything that would hurt another person.

We signal when we want to say something.

We may say pass.

If a game involves touch we may sit and watch before making a decision to join in.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

The teacher has a cloth bag or a nicely decorated box in which s/he has put different objects or artefacts that the teacher associates with prayer. It will contain the usual things that you find on a prayer space or in a liturgy box but can contain other creative things and things personal to the teacher. Once all the objects are placed together in a space – on a tray or a cloth – ask pupils to look carefully at the objects for ten seconds and then the teacher covers them with a cloth. Ask the children to make a list (on paper) of all the objects they can remember (either individually or pairs).

Step 2. Round

The teacher uncovers the objects and either asks the children what idea links all these objects together or tells the children all the chosen objects have something to do with prayer. The teacher then asks the children

'What links each object to prayer?' and 'How does this object help us to pray?'

Trigger statement:

What helps me to pray is ...

Step 3 Open Forum

Our virtue to live by statement is 'I grow in friendship with God through prayer'. The Church says that prayer is "turning the heart and mind to God". In trios, first ask the children to discuss the meaning of this statement and then how what they describe can help them grow in friendship with God. Trios feedback their ideas. The teacher scribes their ideas down – their responses can be displayed on or near the prayer space or table later.

Step 4. Celebration

Use a guided meditation with reflective instrumental music that focuses on being in the presence of Jesus. There is one you could adapt at Ave Maria Press https://www.avemariapress.com/engagingfaith/guided-meditation-jesus-calms-sea

Step 5: Ending Ritual

Let's think of the different types of prayer, the Church tells us there are 5 types of prayer. Can you name them? (**Petition** – asking something for yourself; **Intercession** – asking for someone else; Thanksgiving; Praise; Blessing/Adoration – recognising God and I'm not God.

Quietly gather: The teacher says 'Let us pray' and invites the children to say what type of prayer they want to say and to say it 'I ask that ... I thank God for ... I praise God because ...

CIRCLE TIME: YEAR: FOUNDATION STAGE

Virtue 4 (Autumn 2): Generosity

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

Play 'Pass the parcel' with a gift box filled with objects (sweets, stickers, toys). If the music stops, ask the child to open the box, select an object and choose a friend to give their object to.

Explain that this was a chance to show generosity with others by sharing. We can also be generous with our time, words and actions, not only objects.

Step 2. Round

Pass an object around the circle and ask the children to share what their favourite toy is, either in school or at home (i.e. bike, scooter, Barbie, cars, dinosaurs etc.).

Ask them to imagine how they would feel about sharing this toy with a friend.

Children listen carefully to the words of affirmation (they may wish to close their eyes); I am generous. I try my best to look for opportunities to give and to share.

Trigger statement:

I will be generous with...

Step 3. Open Forum

Show a wrapped gift and ask the children to imagine that they have received an exciting new toy for their birthday. Show the puppet and explain that he/she would like to play with your new toy. How do you feel? What will you do?

Children respond. Discuss ideas.

Step 4. Celebration

Ask the children to nominate members of the class who they have seen being generous and sharing with others. How do we feel when someone shares with us?

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Sing 'Love is Something, if You Give it Away (Magic Penny)' How will we 'give away' our love this week?

CIRCLE TIME: YEAR: 1/2

Virtue 4 (Autumn 2): Generosity

Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others.

Attitudes:

We signal when we want to say something.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

Play 'Pass the parcel' with a gift box filled with objects (sweets, stickers, toys). If the music stops, ask the child to open the box, select an object and choose a friend to give their object to.

Explain that this was a chance to show generosity with others by sharing. What else can we be generous with? (Our time, words, thoughts and actions.)

Step 2. Round

Show the treasure box. What is your treasure? You might share an idea of your most special possession. Pass a soft toy around the circle and ask the children to share their most treasured possession, such as a toy, item of jewellery, device etc.

Ask them to imagine how they would feel about sharing this item with someone. Would it be easy to share this with others?

Trigger statement: I can be generous when...

Step 3. Open Forum

Sharing is not always easy. When do you find it most difficult to share? When do you feel like sharing? What helps you to be generous?

Children discuss ideas in talk partners.

Step 4. Celebration

On a template of a gift, ask the children to write/ draw something that they will share in school or at home this week. Ask the children to place their offering in the gift box and place on your prayer table or a special area in your classroom.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Read 'The Smartest Giant in Town'. Who showed generosity in the story? How did they show generosity? How did it make others feel?

CIRCLE TIME: YEAR: 3/4

Virtue 4 (Autumn 2): Generosity:

I am generous.

I think of others and notice when they need help.

PSHCE:

Knowledge:

To know that generosity is giving and sharing freely with others.

Skills:

Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others.

Attitudes:

Generosity is giving because you want to, not with the idea of receiving a reward or gift in return. It is an opportunity to give and share just for the joy of giving.

Circle Time Rules:

We listen to each other.

We do not say or do anything that would hurt another person. We signal when we want to say something.

We may say pass.

If a game involves touch we may sit and watch before making a decision to join in.

Skills - Thinking, Looking, Listening, Speaking, Concentrating:

Throughout Circle Time it is vital that teachers praise children for using the above skills.

Step 1. Game

In a larger space, such as the playground or hall, play 'Scarecrow Tig'.

When back in class, discuss the different elements of the game - avoiding being caught but also looking out for friends who have been caught and turned into scarecrows. We had to think about protecting ourselves, but also being generous by saving others.

What does it mean to be 'generous'?

Step 2. Round

Explain that true generosity means giving and sharing freely, without expecting something in return. It is giving just for the joy of giving. Can they share an example of something they have shared in the past, but that they found difficult to share?

Listen carefully to the words of affirmation and repeat them together;

I am generous. I seek opportunities to give and to share. I give freely, fully and joyfully.

Trigger statement:

Giving freely, fully and joyfully means...

Step 3. Open Forum

In groups, give children different scenarios and ask them to discuss; What would generosity look like if...

- A friend comes over to play when you have a new toy?
- Someone who has broken your things in the past wants to borrow your favourite toy?
- Your teacher asks you to do a job for him/her at playtime, but you really want to play outside?
- You find out that a child in your local area doesn't have enough food or clothes?
- Your friend's birthday is coming up and you wonder what to get them?

Children discuss in groups and then feedback ideas to the class.

Step 4. Celebration

Introduce the 'gift wish box'. Each child is given a paper heart and invited to write a gift or gifts that they wish to give to others, for example, their time to help someone, an act of service or a toy that they are willing to share for the day.

When everyone has added their gifts to the box, invite the children to take a heart from the box and enjoy sharing their gifts with each other.

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Make a class list of ways you can be generous with:

- your time and energy,
- your words and thoughts,
- your actions,
- your belongings.

This could be displayed in your RE area or in a class big book.

CIRCLE TIME: YEARS: 5/6

Virtue 4 (Autumn 2): Generosity):

Step 1. Game

In a large space, such as the playground or hall, play 'Scarecrow Tig'.

Discuss the different elements of the game - avoiding being caught but also looking out for friends who have been caught and turned into scarecrows. We had to think about protecting ourselves, but also being generous by rescuing others.

What does it mean to be 'generous'? Can they think of any other games which involve us being generous to others?

Step 2. Round

What is your most treasured possession? (You might share an idea of your most special possession.) Ask the children to discuss their most treasured possession with their group, such as a toy, item of jewellery, photograph, device etc. Why is it important to them?

Ask them to imagine how they would feel about sharing this item with someone. Would it be easy to share this with others? Why/ why not?

Wthout generosity, people would refuse to share their belongings, their time and their friendship. When we give freely, our spirit grows stronger.

Trigger statement:

To share yourself means...

Step 3. Open Forum

There is a famous Chinese Proverb, 'The more one gives, the more one has.' How can this be true?

Split the class in half and hold a debate. Each group has five minutes to discuss their ideas and then present their argument to the rest of the class.

Step 4. Celebration

Draw/ write about three of your favourite things. Are these things to share or things to keep only for your own use? Explain that this decision is up to them, but can be a difficult decision to make. Which one of their favourite things would you willing to share?

Step 5. Ending Ritual

Giving freely involves making sacrifices. Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice when he died on the cross.

What are we willing to sacrifice for others?

Stillness exercise

Love of Learning Meditation

God's gifts are very special and as humans we desire to know, to grow, to develop, to search for meaning and purpose. Of all of God's creation, we have within us a desire to learn. It allows us to be open to the works of the Holy Spirit and the gift of knowledge.

Through learning, and learning from mistakes, helps us grow. God's world is exciting and filled wonderful miracles creating awe and wonder within us to know more.

We are often inspired by a good teacher, by role models to become enthusiastic and self-motivated learners instilling a lifelong passion to learn.

Take this time to feel safe and loved in the presence of the Lord.

Imagine standing in a green field. It is a warm day; the sky is blue with a single fluffy white cloud floating by. Feel the warm sun on your back. Begin to walk through the field and notice the tall trees moving in the warm breeze, birds singing and beautiful flowers swaying in the grass.

You see someone sitting under the tree just ahead of you. As you walk closer, you recognise that it is Jesus. He sees you and calls you by your name... you walk closer...Jesus smiles at you. He pats the ground for you to sit down. Jesus asks you how it feels to start a new school year... to begin a new journey of learning.

Think about this. As you inhale, think "love" ...and as you exhale think learning"

Think about the start of the new school year and all of the exciting learning that lies ahead of you. What is it you want to learn more about? What do you love to learn?...

To love to learn is to have a sense of possibility, be excited about learning and all of the with possibilities. Learning helps us to persevere, even when the learning can be tricky. Despite challenges and frustrations, new learning can be fresh, interesting, and exciting.

Tell Jesus how you feel about this new school year and what you want to learn...

Having a love of learning can create endless opportunities and help us to flourish.

What makes you passionate about learning? Is it the endless possibilities that lie ahead? Does your love of learning help you to use the special gifts and talents God has given you?

Jesus looks and smiles at you as you tell him how excited you are to learn new things.

Jesus says, "Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you." Philippians 4:9

Reach out and give Jesus a hug... and know that He wants you to understand that you are very special to Him. It's time to leave Jesus. Say goodbye...get up and begin to walk away... stop, turn and wave goodbye once more... knowing that Jesus will be with you every step of the way in you learning journey. Through your love of learning and following in Jesus footsteps can give you so many opportunities to grow as a person.

And now, slowly begin to come back into the room. Be aware of your breathing and of your body. Bring your consciousness back in to the room as you breathing in and concentrating on the word love and as you breather out, concentrate on learning. Take a few breaths, opening your eyes, slowly move your fingers and toes. Take a few deep breaths and listen to this prayer.

Closing prayer

As we start this new school year, let us all be grateful and inspired to further develop our love of learning. With Jesus as our guide, we thank you for every opportunity to learn more and more each day. Amen.

Responsible Citizenship meditation

We come together in meditation as members of our school community. We look to God to help us be responsible citizens within our school, our neighbourhood and within God's wider world. Let us take this time to be with God and focus on the importance of being responsible citizens, committed to finding ways to make a positive difference within our communities, seeing each person as our neighbour. Our neighbours are brothers and sisters across the world, who are all children of God...just like us. As God's children we have the responsibility to help each other and look after God's world. Especially in harvest we think of our neighbours and how we can help others in need.

Let us focus on this...take a deep breath...inhale and exhale...

Imagine you are in a crowd and as you approach the front of the group you see Jesus and he smiles at you and invites you to sit next to him.

Jesus begins to tell the crowd a story... the Good Samaritan.

'A man was walking home from work late at night. It was a dangerous place, and sadly the man was attacked by robbers, who seriously hurt him and stole his wallet. They ran off and left the poor man lying on the ground in serious need of help.

A parishioner passed by, saw the man and hurried on to his church. Another person passed, looked at the beaten man and hurried on because he didn't want to be involved.

A little while later an ex-prisoner came by, he saw the man and knew he must do something. He washed and bandaged the man's wounds and took him to a nearby hospital to be cared for.'

Jesus now turns to you and asks, "Which of these people was a good neighbour? Who was a responsible citizen?" Take time to think about this...

Jesus holds your hand saying, "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth." In what ways can you be gentle and king to people around me. How can I show love and concern for others, remembering we are all children of God.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will help be filled." What can you do to make the world a fairer place?...

Spend a moment with Jesus and tell him what you will do to be a responsible citizen. How will you be a good neighbour in school? with your family? and in our wider communities?... We have been blessed with a special job to carry out God's work for the common good of society. This is a privilege... let us really focus on this in the coming weeks.

It is time to leave Jesus...give him a hug and say goodbye...as you walk away think about what God wants you to do. Jesus says, "Do not forget to do good and to help one another, because these are the sacrifices that please God." (Hebrews 13:14; 16)

Think of how you can make a positive difference in our community and look for opportunities to serve others. It is time to leave Jesus but know that Jesus remains with you.

And now, slowly begin to come back into the room. Be aware of your breathing and of your body. Bring your consciousness back in to the room. As you are breathing in concentrate on the word responsible and as you breathe out, concentrate on the word citizen. Take a few breaths, repeating this, opening your eyes, slowly move your fingers and toes. Take a few deep breaths and listen to this prayer.

Closing prayer

Dear Lord,

Thank you for my time with Jesus in meditation. We are thankful for the opportunity to make a difference in our communities and be responsible citizens. Help us to be good neighbours and work together for the common good in acts of service and charity. Let us put our faith into action, contribute to and serve others. During Harvest, let us especially use this time to look after God's creation, make a positive difference to our community and put solidarity into action. Let us be inspired to be responsible citizens. With Jesus as our guide, we thank you for every opportunity to serve God more and more each day. Amen.

Prayer Meditation

As we come together to meditate, we focus on the virtue of prayer. We pray for many different reasons using many different forms of prayer. We share our needs with God in prayer, we thank God in prayer, we praise God in prayer, we ask for God's mercy in prayer, we ask God to help others in prayer. When we talk to our friends and share our needs with each other, our friendships grow, and we become closer. Talking to God in prayer also brings us closer to God. Saints pray to Jesus all the time and have a very strong friendship with Him. Saints' friendships with Jesus helps them share Jesus with others. Like Saints, we can also put our trust in God in prayer.

Let us focus on this...take a deep breath...inhale and exhale...

Let's now spend some time with Jesus. You are standing at the Sea of Galilee. The water is clear blue with the gentle wave lapping onto the shore. The sand is golden and soft and warm beneath your feet. There is not a cloud in the sky. It is a beautiful day with the gentle breeze from the sea keeping you cool. Close your eyes... breathe in the sea air...exhale and relax...

Take a walk along the beach, wiggle your toes as you walk, feeling the warm sand between them. The cool water laps ashore covering your feet, keeping them cool. You see some people sitting on the beach just ahead of you. Jesus is with the crowd of people. Go and join them. Sit down next to Jesus and listen to His teaching. Jesus is speaking about asking God for something... and it will be given into you.

Jesus turns and smiles at you calling you by name... spend some time with Jesus, talking quietly about your prayers...Thank Jesus for being your friend and for listening to you.

As you inhale, think "pray" ...and as you exhale think Amen."

Jesus looks and smiles at you and says, "Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful." Colossians 4:2

Reach out and give Jesus a hug... and know that He wants you to understand that you are very special to Him. It's time to leave Jesus. Say goodbye...get up and begin to walk away... stop, turn and wave goodbye once more... knowing that Jesus will be with you every step of the way and by praying will keep you close to Him.

And now, slowly begin to come back into the room. Be aware of your breathing and of your body. Bring your consciousness back in to the room as you are breathing in and concentrating on the word pray and as you breathe out, concentrate on the word Amen. Take a few breaths, opening your eyes, slowly move your fingers and toes. Take a few deep breaths and listen to this prayer.

Closing prayer

Dear Lord,

Thank you for giving us Jesus as our friend. We have someone special to talk to in prayer whenever we need to. Help us to know that praying brings us closer to God and we will trust Him with our thoughts and needs. Like the Saints, may we please Jesus by praying whenever we can for those who needs God's help the most and to thank God for everything He has given is.

With Jesus as our guide, we thank you for every opportunity to pray more and more each day. Amen.

Virtue to Live By: Generosity

You notice when someone needs help. You think of others before yourself. You give freely without need of reward. You give more than what is expected. You are willing to make sacrifices for others.

"You should give what you have decided to give, not grudgingly or because you are made to, for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:7).

Setting the Scene/Focal point on floor or low table:

Purple cloth for Advent time, candles, dimmed lights, spiritual/reflective image on interactive whiteboard or as part of prayer focus, Bible, prayer stones, religious artefacts, plants, shells, advent wreath, objects to link to the theme.

Meditative music/ peaceful/calming hymns quietly playing e.g. Advent music https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kDACqnjNIRI https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ru91hoMASQc

<u>Gathering together – children</u> enter to calm meditative music and sit in a horseshoe around the focal point.

Stillness exercise

Close your eyes, sit comfortably, place your hands on your knees, allow the music to help you relax, take a deep breath in slowly and deeply through your nose, hold your breath for 3-4 seconds and breathe out through your mouth. Continue to take a few deep breaths, allowing the music to help you relax each part of your body from the tips of your toes to the top of your head. Lift your shoulders and then relax, relax your arms, legs, stomach, face, concentrating on your breathing inhale...exhale...inhale...exhale...every part of your body.

Generosity meditation

As a Catholic community we try to be generous with our time, gifts and talents. When we are generous, we are helping others because we know there is enough for everyone. We are not afraid of giving what we have as generosity teaches us not to be selfish. Jesus asks us all to give of ourselves.

Let us focus on how we can be generous in sharing our gifts, talents, time and spirit bringing us closer to God... Take a deep breath...inhale and exhale...

Imagine you are with Jesus' disciples at the temple. The temple is cool inside, keeping you shaded from the blazing sun outside. The walls and flow are made of light coloured marble. Feel the coolness of the marble on your legs as you sit with the disciples. The pillars of the temple are made of marble and decorated with gold.

Lots of people are entering the temple, it is the time of Passover. They have come to celebrate this great feast.

You quietly watch people throwing coins into the collection boxes as they enter the temple. Judas and Matthew are sitting next to you and begin to quarrel about how much money people are giving. Matthew, a former tax collector, sees a man dressed in fine clothes and

comments that he is wealthy and should have given much more money. You look at Jesus to see if he agrees with Matthew, but Jesus is watching a woman walking towards the treasury box. The coins she throws in barely make a sound as they drop into the box. Jesus turns to you and says, "She's a poor widow." Matthew says, "She gave two mites, a penny." You watch the woman turn and begin to walk away...

Jesus says, "This woman has given more than everyone else who threw money into the treasury... All of them gave more money, but they have more to give...she gave all she had to live on. She gave more to God than all the rich people."

You watch the woman walk away and disappear into the crowd. Jesus turns to you and says, "That was a very courageous and generous thing to do. Her faith and trust in God have grown by being generous."

Think about what this means... Jesus asks you, "What can you do to help others?" Jesus watches you and smiles as he can see you are thinking and willing to give of your time, gifts and talents to help your family, friends, and neighbours.

Spend a moment talking to Jesus and tell him how you will show generosity in the coming weeks. Tell Jesus how you will help others willingly and selflessly...

It is time to leave Jesus...he is pleased with you. He can see that you will give cheerfully and without expectation of reward. Give Jesus a hug and say goodbye...as you walk away think about how you will be generous in time and spirit. Jesus calls to you saying, "Freely you have received, freely give." (Matthew 10:8)

With Jesus' guidance think of how you can live this virtue of generosity to make a positive difference. It is time to leave Jesus but know that Jesus remains with you and will teach you how to give of yourself to help others.

And now, slowly begin to come back into the room. Be aware of your breathing and of your body. Bring your consciousness back in to the room. As you are breathing in concentrate on the word generosity and as you breathe out, concentrate on the word giving. Take a few breaths, repeating this... opening your eyes, slowly move your fingers and toes and relax. Take a few deep breaths and listen to this prayer.

Closing prayer

Dear Lord,

Thank you for my time with Jesus. I know you want me to be generous with my time, gifts, talents and spirit. We are thankful for the opportunities to help others. We pray to you to teach us how to do so selflessly, without expectation of reward. As we make our Advent promises, let us be guided by the virtue of generosity using this time to share what we have to help those who are less fortunate than us. Let us be inspired by Jesus to live the virtue of generosity. We thank you for giving us such a wonderful role model in Christ Jesus as we try each day to be more like Him. Amen.
